AmeyMouchel Cultural Heritage Strategy for Area 9 [SW Midlands]

This LGAP goes from strength to strength. Over 50 members of the Cheshire County Council planning department listened to a talk by Cynthia Burek on the importance of partnership within an LGAP. Implications from research conducted under the banner of the LGAP and UCC on the effect of age on landscape appreciation showed that leaflets are high on all age agendas but media low. As expected animals but not plants, rocks or fossils had high conservation value.

Current Developments in Earth Science Education

The House of Commons May meeting presented current developments in Earth Science Education, led by Chris King. He began by outlining the work of ESEU, supported by the Earth Science Teachers' Association [ESTA] and funded by the oil industry [UK Offshore Operators Association]. ESEU presents Earth science workshops free to secondary school science departments through 37 trained facilitators in England and Wales, and will be launching in Scotland at the ESTA conference in September 2004. Several of the ESEU facilitators are also heavily involved in RIGS.

UKRIGS actions

The UKRIGS Executive Committee has approved unanimously the Action Plan and Communication Strategy at the July 2004 executive meeting.

These detailed documents will

forward the aims of UKRIGS. There are some minor changes to the constitution to clear up ambiguities that have been identified. Thus an SGM will be called before the next AGM. Details are included with this newsletter. Thanks to Derek France for producing this new style newsletter. We have a new editor starting in September.
